Toots Keesing – older sister Ruth. Their dad managed Bohemia Stadium where boxing events were held.

Thelma Just(?) - married Keith Elliott, son of Charles Elliott who was an accountant and stockbroker

Ray Cook – lived at Real St, house still stands. Volunteered on committee at Fort Lytton. (SEE NOTES)

Gwen Sheffield – became secretary in Union Trustee Company – attractive girl and reserved

Peggy Roche – Correct name is ‘Marguerete’ and is the daughter of Marguerete Roche who was the head of the AMWAAS.

Peggy is cousin to Noel and Eileen Board who were both on staff at NAB (Nat Bank) where Peggy was also till she married ? Borne. They lived on their farm at Laidley. Peg is still actively associated with the RSL there.

She was a clever student.

Beryl Threlfall – lived in Portland St. Brother was John. Their mother was very strict particularly on Beryl. Father Norm was involved in a business with George Chester Banana Merchant in Turbot St Markets. Beryl married ? Parrot who at one stage manager of HA Manahan’s store in Gatton.

Margaret Watson – daughter of Richard Pilkington Watson who left the QN Bank as manager of Grantham to establish a very sound produce agency with office at railway yards at Gatton. Ron Clark did his books and Tom Hennessey was the buyer.

Betty Cosgrove – grandfather owned Cosgrove & Co cordial factory – brick building near The Gabba. Betty had light auburn hair, naturally wavy

Keith Benjamin – father was Eric Benjamin. Keith was last known in an accounting business at Nambour

Rae Durrant – lived in Junction Terrace with older sister Alva. Rae married American serviceman

Pansy Angel – brother Arthur Angel lived in Cracknell Road area

Peggy Woods – lived in Devon St. Her brother Ron became an ENT specialist. In Grade 5 Peggy an operation on her mastoids which yielded a long recovery time

Betty Longhorn – lived in Short St later known as Laurier St. Father was a tram conductor.

Beverly Belford - very good at sports particularly basketball. Brother sporty as well.

Fay Griffiths – lived on corner of Louis St and Ipswich Rd.

Joan Packman – sat next to Alan Adsett in Grade 7. Did a commercial course at SCHS. Cousins were Bill and Jim whose father taught at Moorooka SS.

Edith Manley – lived in 382 Annerley Rd. Went to BGGs and worked in the Commonwealth Bank and married a ? Howard. Retired to Redcliffe

Joy Winnett - joined WRANS – secretarial role? Older brother Doug was secretary of Maclaggan Dairy Corporation.

Joy married Neville Smith who worked for leading firm of solicitors, Morris Fletcher and Cross

Alma Rogers – married Reggie Ballard who worked for the John Stewart & Son grocers at Annerley.

Her father was blind and he attended the Blind Institute

He was very well dressed and wore a suit and hat and walked home by himself as far as Denham St where he was met by a family member.

Peggy Skov – had younger brother Gordon. Lived off Dudley St East. Her aunt Madge married Alan Adsett's cousin Percy Hirst.

Her father had a motor garage in East Brisbane/Woollongabba

Gordon Pepperal – father had a boot repair shop on Ipswich Road adjacent to Mewing's grocery shop at cnr Ipswich Rd and Cornwall St (eastern side) TO IPSWICH RD, DRESSED IN HIS MASON

Leila Coward – sister Elva. Father was a butcher trading as A.E. Coward on corner of Real St and Gustavon St.

Norman Strachan – only child of people who owned the fruit shop Strachans.

Jim Clark – older brother Dougald married Fay Carthew. Jim worked for the NAB for a time then left the bank to work for sharebrokers A.L. Nevitt & Company.

Jim's father, also Dougald drove a little Citroen and coming from Fernvale St to Ipswich Rd dressed in his masonic Regalia. Alan Adsett, on his pushbike, attempted to overtake him but was clearly told to go home. The endeavour to pass occurred near Ekibin Road
